Transatlantic communications



Recent events in the USA and the UK have brought the communities of Melton and Clarksville in Indiana even closer together-with prospects of stronger links developing in the future.

Following on a successful visit by a group from Clarksville last year, communications developing friendship and greater understanding have flowed between members of the Melton and District Twinning Association and the Clarksville Sister Cities Association.

The latest communication from our Association was sent by chairman John Rudman following the terrorist attacks on New York's World Trade Centre and Washington DC's Pentagon on September 11th.

Although Clarksville is some way from New York and Washington DC, the shock of the attacks was felt around the USA - as well as the rest of the world- and John wrote letters of sympathy and condolence from the Association to John Minta, the president of the Clarksville Town Council, and Lynn Lewis, President of the Clarksville Sister Cities Association.

With the USA celebrating Thanksgiving Day on November 22nd, John also sent the Twinning Association's best wishes to the people of Clarksville through an email to Mr Minta.

Members might remember that the Clarksville community leaders, knowing that Melton is in the middle of a farming area, sent letters of support and concern following the outbreak of Foot and Mouth around the UK.

It is an indication of how friendships that began during the Clarksville delegation's visit to Melton last year have flourished.

More Transatlantic link-ups sought

A number of people in Clarksville have indicated they would like to correspond with people in Melton by email or by ordinary mail.

Those Association members in contact with Clarksville residents are already finding letters from America full of interest and warmth.

A stitch in time...

Twinning Association member Dinah Rudman is flexing her sewing fingers to start work on a Melton contribution to a project celebrating Clarksville's history.

She is contributing a design square for a memorial quilt being prepared by a quilting group from the US community as part of Clarksville's major celebrations for the bicentenary of the pioneering Lewis and Clark expeditions across America.

Lewis and Clark covered 8,000 miles from the Mississippi River west to the Pacific Ocean during a US government-backed exploration in 1804-5 charting the massive area of land known as the Louisiana Territory from the French in 1803. It was from the banks of the Ohio River at Clarksville in 1803 that Lewis and Clark began their expedition.

The Clarksville memorial quilt will focus on the town's history. But it was felt that a contribution from Melton would be a welcome addition to symbolize the friendship between the two towns.

Dinah's square, which she hopes to complete by January next year, will portray the Melton Parish Church. It will add a bit of Melton history to that of our American friends from Clarksville.

The road to Kapelle

It was a case of better luck next time for the Dutch treat of a weekend planned by the Melton contingent set to travel to Kapelle for the August Bank Holiday.

A total of four cars full of Melton folk was expected to head to our Dutch twin town for the annual Kapelle Day. This is the highly enjoyable annual event where the town's streets are filled with stalls, the Ring Riders display their skills, many local people wear their national dress, marching bands perform and large quantities of beer, coffee, apple pies and other delicacies are consumed.

It was the marching bands that formed the first friendship link between Melton and Kapelle and led to the present formal Twinning agreement between our two communities about 12 years ago.

But a few spanners in the works of the arrangements for the Melton group travelling to this year's event meant that the Borough's mayor Tim Cullen and his son

Jack were the only ones who eventually managed to make it to Kapelle to join in the celebrations including the Kapelle Day parade.

Unfortunately, plans by Nick and Nadine Leah to take the veteran Morris Minor, kindly donated by John and Gill Lister for restoration by Nick and the young members of his Motor Car Project team, over to the Netherlands to participate in the Kapelle Day Parade had to be postponed.

Nick and the youngsters enrolled on the restoration project, some of whom would have also travelled out to Kapelle with the car, did not manage to finish the Morris Minor to the standard they wanted.

Hopefully the Dutch trip for Nick Leah, their young helpers and the veteran vehicle can be resurrected for next Kapelle Day to show off good English craftsmanship.

Sadly, Sue Gowans and her daughter were also not able to attend Kapelle Day as planned. The Kapelle Twinning Association were not able to find a host family while Kapelle has no guesthouses and the only hotel, the Swan, was not taking guests that weekend.

Sue, who is masterminding Melton's second Food Fair on Sunday, December 2nd, had hoped to make some useful contacts.

Although it was disappointing for all those who were not able to attend this year's Kapelle Day, Councillor Cullen and Master Cullen can obviously recommend the event.

Reports back to the Twinning Association indicate the Cullens had a good time carrying the Melton Mowbray & District banner during Kapelle's festivities. They were given a wonderful welcome by our Dutch friends, met the Kapelle fire fighters and had their photographs taken with Dutch ladies in costume.

A visit to Kapelle is great fun and well worthwhile and hopefully next Kapelle Day might be a great time to see a larger Melton presence.

For anyone keen to visit our Dutch twin town in the future, the Twinning Association is going to compile a little guide to transport links to Kapelle and accommodation in and around the town.

Tim and Jack's travel arrangements included flying out to Amsterdam then letting the train take the strain to reach Kapelle. Tim said it was very easy.

It is possible to go by train all the way from Melton to Kapelle - via ferries from Harwich to the Hook or going under the Channel on Eurostar services-with public transport in the Netherlands being first rate. There are some motels, chalet sites and good camp sites not too far from Kapelle.

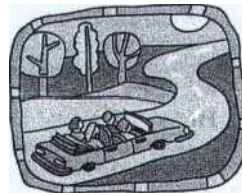
